

## SAMPLE NEWSLETTER ARTICLE

With Governor Chris Gregoire's signature on Monday, February 13<sup>th</sup>, Washington joined six other states and the District of Columbia in allowing same-sex couples to marry.

But the fight for marriage equality is far from over; and, it needs your help.

Opponents of the new law -- fueled by conservative churches and deep-pocket out of state donors -- are now gathering signatures to place a referendum on the November statewide ballot that would ask voters to approve or reject the law.

The opponents have until June 6 to gather 120,577 signatures for what will be called "Referendum 74." With such a relatively small number of signatures to gather, it's almost certain we'll see R-74 on the November ballot. Anti-equality clergy and politicians are already urging their constituencies to sign referendum petitions.

In response, a large, diverse and growing coalition of organizations called **Washington United for Marriage** is gearing up to wage a strong, well-funded campaign to protect the freedom to marry.

A committed staff of campaign professionals is already hard at work across the state. A robust advertising campaign, press and field efforts will educate voters and get a million of them out to vote (by mail) next fall. The opposition's scare tactics and deceptions will be met head on: rapidly, forcefully, and effectively.

But, the campaign to approve R-74 will only be successful with the money, time and voice of people like you. Money is particularly important – right now -- to secure advertising on radio and TV in what will be the biggest and costliest election season ever.
